The debate surrounding the mint julep's origin and recipe is so heated, some claim the argument about the drink sparked the Civil War. Regardless, one thing's for sure: The mint julep has been a Southern tradition since long before 1938, the year derby ladies at Churchill Downs first sipped the minty concoction from a souvenir glass created for the event. Today, the drink and its iconic container remain a Derby staple, but you don't need to attend the races to join in on the horseplay.
